Kolkata. Heavy rains in Kolkata, West Bengal, have killed at least 10 people, disrupting normal life and disrupting rail, road, and air services. The West Bengal government has declared early Durga Puja holidays for government schools and advised people to stay indoors. Sources said the deaths were caused by electrocution after coming into contact with fallen electric poles or broken wires. Sources said the city experienced heavy rain for five hours continuously since Monday midnight, possibly the result of a cloudburst, and continued intermittently until this afternoon. This flooded the city and affected almost all roads, as well as transportation to neighboring districts.

At UNGA, Trump criticises United Nations, calls India and China 'primary funders' of Russia's war in Ukraine**Agency**

New York: President Donald Trump on Tuesday criticised the United Nations, saying it's "empty words and empty words don't solve wars".

Addressing the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) Session in New York, his first since 2020, Trump said that he ended seven wars, including India and Pakistan in a period of just seven months, something that, according to the US President, should have been the work of the United Nations. "I ended seven wars... No president or prime minister, and for that matter, no other country has ever done anything close to that. I did it in just seven months. It's never happened before. I'm very honoured to have done it. It's too bad that I had to do these things instead of the United Nations



doing them," he said. The US President said that the UN did not even try to help in any of the wars he mentioned.

"I ended seven wars, dealt with the leaders of each and every one of these countries, and never even received a phone call from the United Nations offering to help in finalising the deal," he said. On a lighter note, the US President said that all he got from the UN was an escalator that stopped right in the middle and a teleprompter that didn't work. "All I got from the United

Nations was an escalator that, on the way up, stopped right in the middle." If the First Lady wasn't in great shape, she would have fallen, but she's in great shape. We're both in good shape. And then a teleprompter that didn't work. These are the 2 things I got from the United Nations..." he said.

Trump further questioned the purpose of the United Nations if the global organisation is not living up to its potential. "They weren't there. I thought of it really after the fact, not during these

negotiations, which were not easy. That being the case, what is the purpose of the United Nations? The UN has such tremendous potential. It has such tremendous potential but it's not even coming close to living up to that potential, for the most part..." he added.

From the global stage, Trump also launched a scathing attack on India and China, accusing the two nations of funding Russia's war in Ukraine. However, he also criticised NATO countries for their energy trade with Russia. "China and India are the primary funders of the ongoing war by continuing to purchase Russian oil. But inexcusably, even NATO countries have not cut off much Russian energy and Russian energy products, which, as you know, I found out about two weeks ago, and I wasn't happy.

ED raids 9 locations across Ranchi, Delhi, in land scam**DB Reporter**

Ranchi: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Tuesday carried out raids at six locations in Ranchi and three in Delhi linked to Kamlesh Kumar Singh in a major land scam case.

During the raids, the agency seized ₹25 lakh in cash, along with bank accounts, documents related to land transactions, and digital devices.

The raids targeted properties connected to BK Singh of Kanke Resort, Durga Developers, and their associates, who have been identified as key figures in manipulating land records in collusion with government officials.

Earlier investigations had marked BK Singh as the ringleader of the land racket in Kanke, while Kamlesh Kumar Singh and others were identified as his associates.

In a previous raid at Kamlesh Kumar Singh's residence, cash worth ₹1 crore and rifle ammunition were also recovered. According to sources, ED officials carried out searches at Kanke Resort, Sukhdev Nagar and his associates.

Durga Developers, established in December 1997 with a share capital of ₹50 lakh and headed by Managing Director Anil Kumar Jha along with family members as directors, was also included in the raids.

The raids form part of the ED's ongoing money laundering probe into land dealings in the Kanke block. On July 10, 2024, the ED had already verified disputed land in Chama Mouza of Kanke, which included CNT and government land.

During that exercise, the agency had examined land records at Kanke Resort and the Kanke Circle Office and recorded statements from local residents regarding the disputed property.

This latest round of raids marks a continuation of the ED's crackdown on alleged manipulation of land records and financial irregularities by individuals linked to Kamlesh Kumar Singh and his associates.

Four Arrested in Attempted Robbery at JC Jewellers in Ramgarh

Ramgarh: In a major breakthrough, Ramgarh Police arrested four members of an inter-state criminal gang involved in an attempted robbery at JC Jewellers, located near Golpar, Ramgarh, on September 7. The arrests were announced during a press conference held by Superintendent of Police (SP) Ajay Kumar on September 23.

Following the failed heist attempt, a Special Investigation Team (SIT) was formed under the leadership of Sub-Divisional Police Officer (SDPO) Parmeshwar Prasad. The SIT analyzed over 1,000 CCTV footages and conducted raids at multiple locations based on technical surveillance.

Acting on a tip-off, the SIT raided a secluded area in Gobardaha where gang members were allegedly planning another robbery in Bokaro. While attempting to flee, four suspects were apprehended, and one escaped on a motorcycle.

The arrested individuals were iden-



tified as:

1. Rupesh Vishwakarma alias Pankaj (Garhwa, Jharkhand)
 2. Dheeraj Mishra (Buxar, Bihar)
 3. Rahul Yadav (Aurangabad, Bihar)

- Police recovered:
- "2 country-made pistols, 2 desi kattas, 21 live rounds
 - "3 motorcycles, 1 scooter, 9 mobile phones
 - "Fake Aadhaar & PAN cards, debit card, knife, stripper cutter, SIM cards, and dongle
- SP Ajay Kumar stated that this

gang has been active in jewellery and bank heists across Jharkhand and Bihar for over 15 years, and was previously involved in high-profile crimes including: "A ?1.47 crore cash and ?3 crore gold loot in Koderma (2021)" "A ?40 lakh jewellery heist in Aurangabad (2018)" "The murder of District Councillor Vaid Prakash Singh in Ranchi (2021)" All accused have prior criminal records and were residing in Ramgarh on rent to plan their operations. A separate FIR has been registered under Arms Act and relevant sections of the BNS-2023.

In Morena, Hindu children are being illegally taught religious education in madrasas

Bhopal, Agency: In Madrasa Moin (Gopalpur Hall, Keshav Colony) in Morena district of Madhya Pradesh, even today five Hindu children are receiving education in religion, that is, Islam. At Madrasa Rahim Urdu Primary (Islampura), eight Hindu children receive religious education.


The number of Hindu children in Madrasa Anjuman Islamia Alia (Purana Jaura) is 24. After questioning the children studying in these Madrasas, it became clear that the Maulvis there impart religious education along with modern education.

More emphasis is being given to the children on the teachings of Quran Majeed, Hadith and Talmul Islam. Despite these obvious facts, the School Education Department remains blindfolded and deaf. The

Education Department is not only ignoring but also flouting the order issued by Dr. Mohan Yadav's government a year ago.

A detailed and factual report from Morena district, Madhya Pradesh, reveals that 2,514 children study in the district's 55 recognized madrasas. Of these, 1,958 are Muslim, while 556 are Hindu. The number of children studying in unrecognized madrasas is different. Due to the negligible fees, even Hindus send their children there. According to the rules, they should only be provided with modern education. However, flouting the rules, Hindu children, along with Muslim children, are also being taught the religion (Din), i.e., Islam, and Islamic customs.

All this continues even though in August last year,



the School Education Department issued an order clearly warning that if fraudulent names of non-Muslim or Muslim students are found among the students studying in madrasas, or if religious education is imparted to children without the permission of their parents, then the recognition of such madrasas will be cancelled and their financial aid will be stopped. For this, the state government

cited Article 28 (3) of the Constitution.

Instructions were given for action against those who ignored the rules.

In an order issued on August 16, 2024, by Commissioner of Public Instruction Shilpa Gupta, officials of the School Education Department were also instructed to inspect all madrasas and check whether non-Muslim children are

studying there.

The instructions stated that action should be taken against madrasas where non-Muslim children are found studying. Even more concerning is that School Education Minister Uday Pratap Singh himself stated, "Hindu children will not be allowed to study in madrasas in the state. If this is found to be happening, action will be taken based on violation of rules."

Meanwhile, the then-Chairman of the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR), Priyank Kanoongo, also stated, "Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav has assured that no Hindu child in Madhya Pradesh will receive education in a madrasa. We have no doubt about his intentions. The Commission is writing to the Madhya Pradesh govern-

ment to request that any Hindu child studying in a madrasa be sent to us with a consent letter from their parents under Article 28 (3) of the Constitution.

The state has yet to submit any information regarding this matter to the NCPCR. The fact is that the number of Hindu children studying in madrasas across the state has not decreased. Even more shocking is that while previously only Muslims operated madrasas, now Hindu names are also appearing among the madrasa operators. This is being done to exploit the concessions provided in the name of education.

The Child Protection Commission has expressed its objection. Meanwhile, the biggest objection has come from the Madhya Pradesh Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR).

5,320 villages in Maharashtra hit by floods, over 35 people airlifted

Mumbai, Agency: Due to torrential rains and water overflowing from reservoirs in 30 districts of Maharashtra, 5,320 villages were affected by floods on Tuesday. Many people were surrounded by floodwaters. More than 35 people were airlifted in Beed this morning. Relief and rescue operations are underway. While the Deputy Chief Ministers reviewed the flood situation, the Chief Minister has

directed the local administration to coordinate and take necessary steps.

Disaster management sources said on Tuesday that heavy rains have wreaked havoc in Marathwada, including Jalgaon, Ahilyanagar, and Solapur districts. A total of 8 people have died due to floods in Marathwada. Of these, three died in Latur, one in Dharashiv, two in Beed, and one in Nanded.

A total of 150 animals, both large and small, were killed in Marathwada. These include five in Sambhajinagar district, 15 in Jalna, six in Parbhani district, six in Hingoli, nine in Nanded



district, 63 in Beed district, seven in Latur district, and 21 in Dharashiv district.

Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar reviewed the flood situation today and ordered the administration to take immediate action and airlift people from affected areas.

Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde has called the district collectors

of Beed, Dharashiv, Latur, Parbhani, and Hingoli to review the situation.

Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis has asked the local administration to take necessary steps in coordination with the State Water Resources Department. A statement issued by the Chief Minister's Office said, "The Chief Minister is closely monitoring the situation.

It is important to break the misconceptions about processed food: Chirag

that food processing can also help in increasing the income of farmers and it also plays an important role in reducing post-harvest losses. He clarified that processing does not mean that any food item has become unhealthy. Today, there are many "ready-to-eat" and "ready-to-cook" products whose quality is not only inferior to home-cooked food, but also superior.

He said that his ministry has also released a booklet on this subject to provide accurate information to the public and dispel misconceptions. Whenever information related to any process, especially food processing, reaches

the public, it should be based on scientific facts.

Paswan said that a committee has been formed to draft regulations regarding rumors spreading on social media regarding processed food. While the right to freedom of expression cannot directly prohibit anyone, it is important to stop the spread of misinformation. He said that deliberate misleading propaganda is being spread in this sector, creating fear among the public. Consumption conundrum: On the Indian economy's predicament

The government's push this year to spur consumption in the economy is a much-needed policy re-prioritisation at a time when several other engines of growth are either flagging or plateauing. The economy is a composite of household consumption, private investment, government expenditure and net exports. Of these, only government expenditure has witnessed robust growth over the past few years, thanks to the Modi government's infrastructure push. It has also made available interest-free loans to States to do the same. However, as Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has indicated in the last two Union Budgets, even though the Centre will increase its capital expenditure, it will not be at the blistering rate of 30%-35% that the early post-COVID-19 pandemic years saw. The government has other developmental and defence priorities that need funds too. It is time for the private sector to step up its investments. Private investment has grown, but not nearly at the rate needed to move India from 6%-6.5% growth to the more than 8% needed to meet the targets. Given that industrial capacity utilisation has not crossed 80% since March 2011, the only way to induce more private investment is to increase demand substantially. Net exports, especially merchandise, are struggling due to the global uncertainty around trade, and the U.S.'s 50% tariffs imposed on Indian imports. That is, demand from abroad is petering out, which leaves household consumption to do the heavy lifting.

There are two ways to encourage people to spend — increasing their incomes and lowering prices. The GST rate reforms, with effect from September 22, are a significant step in executing the latter. According to a study published by FICCI, more than three-fourths of rural monthly expenditure will attract either nil or 5% GST rates. This was previously 56%. For urban Indians, this proportion has been increased from half to two-thirds. On the income side, the government tried to put more money in people's pockets by reducing income-tax rates in Budget 2025. This was a welcome and necessary step, although it is not enough to encourage a change in spending behaviour.

Increased awareness and policy initiatives are required to promote its application in educational settings and public life. Banu Mushtaq: Mysore Dussehra a political attack on Hindu faith

India's greatest identity is its cultural diversity and religious tolerance. A tradition of coexistence has existed here for centuries. However, Karnataka has once again exemplified how appeasement politics, exploiting this tradition, has weakened Indian society from within. A recent incident can be seen during the Mysore Dussehra festival in Karnataka.

Navratri began on Monday, September 22, 2025. This was a time when Kalash installation and worship of the Goddess were taking place in temples across the country. However, on the same day, in Congress-ruled Karnataka, something was happening that hurt the faith of millions of Hindus. Mysore's world-famous Dussehra festival, which begins at the Goddess Chamundeshwari Temple, was this time hosted by a Muslim writer named Banu Mushtaq. She entered the temple, offered flowers to the idol of the goddess, and formally initiated the ritual.

At first glance, this may appear to be an attempt at inclusiveness and religious harmony, but in reality, it is a direct attack on Hindu faith. Banu Mushtaq not only comes from an Islamic background, but has repeatedly criticized goddess worship as superstition in public forums. In her previous statements, she has repeatedly denied the god-

dess's power, stating that true power comes not from an idol but from the formless (Allah). This could be interpreted as a direct attack on Hindu goddess worship.

Furthermore, she has also questioned the Kannada language and culture. The Kannada-speaking community has long taken pride in associating the language with Goddess Saraswati. However, Banu Mushtaq states that language is merely a medium of communication, having nothing to do with the goddess. It is a misguided notion to consider it a gift from Goddess Saraswati. This statement not only hurts the deep faith of Kannada speakers but also insults every Hindu who worships Goddess Saraswati in their native languages. Furthermore, he also stated that the worship of gods and goddesses divides society, and that equality is possible only when people rise above idols and believe in one God. This viewpoint is entirely in line with Islamic monotheism, which rejects polytheism. Clearly, making

someone who holds views that negate the spirit of a festival like Dussehra the chief guest is not an insult to the sentiments of Hindu society.

His views on women's empowerment are also controversial. He stated that women's power comes not from Goddess Durga or Chamundeshwari, but from education and rights. At first glance, this appears to be a progressive idea, but when presented as a rejection of goddess worship, it reflects a mindset bent on rejecting traditional beliefs. The irony is that she has always avoided raising questions on women's rights within Islam, but never misses an opportunity to put the Sanatan tradition in the dock.

Now the question arises: why was such a woman appointed the chief guest at a festival like Dussehra? The answer is clear: this is part of the politics of appeasement. The Congress government is demonstrating that it represents the minority community. Through Banu Mushtaq, the government is

clearly stating that it can do whatever it wants, that it will sit at the center of majority traditions and do whatever it wants, and no one can do anything to it. In reality, this is not merely an attempt at religious neutrality, but a disregard and insult to majority beliefs.

When this entire matter was challenged in court, the court dismissed the petition, calling it a "government event." The question is: is an Agamic ritual, which has been going on for centuries, merely a government event? Then, the government intervenes in every major event and temple. Will the government intervene in any event that the government wishes to do, and Hindus will simply be onlookers?

This controversy is apparently about a single event, but it has far-reaching implications. This sends the message that Hindu festivals and traditions have become commodities for political bargaining. This poses a serious threat to society's cultural identity. If Hindu society doesn't become vigilant today,

tomorrow its temples, traditions, and beliefs will be completely transformed into political laboratories. This begs the question: is this the first time the Congress party has attacked Hindu faith? Absolutely not. The past is replete with hundreds of examples where Hindu traditions have been denigrated for Muslim appeasement. But the question is, who gives the Congress this opportunity again and again? The answer is clear: the same Hindu public, who forgot their faith and identity while voting and later lament their neglect. Today, introspection is needed. Will we stand up to protect our traditions or be content with expressing outrage on social media? Will we leave our festivals and rituals to the interpretation of a government or court, or will we protect their dignity ourselves? This incident reminds us that temples, rituals, and traditions are not the property of any government or individual.

They are a cultural heritage passed down through the ages, the protection of which rests with society itself.

Full list of items falling under the new GST tax slab, these items have become cheaper

New Delhi, Agency: The Goods and Services Tax (GST) rates implemented from September 22nd under the next-gen GST reforms have significantly benefited the lower and middle-class groups. The new rates have been implemented on everything from soap to small cars, dry fruits to air conditioners. The GST Council has simplified the new GST structure by creating two slabs of 5% and 18%. Additionally, a new 40% slab has been introduced for "luxury" or "impure" goods. Some items will now attract zero% GST. All rates except the 40% slab have become effective from September 22nd. Let us know how much GST consumers will have to pay on which items.

Items under 0% GST

The GST Council has included stationery items under the 0% GST ambit, including exercise books, notebooks, erasers, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, pastels, maps, charts, and globes. Among food items, Ultra-High Temperature (UHT) milk will also attract 0% GST. Furthermore, 33 life-saving drugs will attract 0% GST. Some of these drugs include asimilinib, mepolizumab, daratumumab, teclistamab, amivantamab, alecitinib, etc.

Items under 5% GST slab
The list of items under the 5% GST slab includes everyday food items such as condensed milk, butter, ghee, dairy fats and spreads, cheese, Brazil nuts, almonds, pistachios, dates, figs, dried mangoes, and citrus fruits. Beedi leaves, Indian catechu, tallow oil,

crude glycerol, and vegetable wax are some of the other items on which the GST rate has been reduced to 5%. Food items such as pasta, noodles, cornflakes, pastries, and cakes have also been included in the 5% GST slab. Among healthcare items, thermometers, medical-grade oxygen, diagnostic kits and reagents, glucometers, and test

strips have been placed in this GST slab, down from the previous 12 or 18% GST. Everyday items such as face powder, hair oil, shampoo, toothpaste, tooth powder, and shaving cream will also see a reduction in prices. Items falling under the 18% GST slab include petrol and petrol hybrid LPG, CNG cars (1200 cc and not exceeding

4000 mm), diesel and diesel hybrid cars (1500 cc and not exceeding 4000 mm). Three-wheelers, motorcycles (350 cc and less), and motor vehicles for the transport of goods are also in the 18% tax slab. Furthermore, GST on electronic equipment, including air conditioners, televisions larger than 32 inches, monitors, and projectors, has been reduced from 28% to 18%.

Items falling in the 40% GST slab

The GST Council has created a separate 40% GST slab for luxury goods, which includes pan masala, sugar-sweetened/flavored aerated beverages, carbonated fruit beverages, tobacco (cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco, vapes), and luxury cars (with engine capacity greater than

1200 cc for petrol cars and 1500 cc for diesel cars). This also includes motorcycles with engine capacity greater than 350 cc, boats, private vessels, and aircraft for private use.

Meaning of GST Rates:

In India, the GST rate refers to the percentage tax levied on the sale of goods or services. Therefore, the GST rate is applicable under the CGST, SGST, and IGST Acts. The CGST and SGST rates will be half of the IGST rate. The Ministry of Consumer Affairs issued a statement titled "GST Savings Festival! Employees' Provident Fund Organisation added 21.04 lakh new members in July

New Delhi, Agency: The Employees' Provident Fund Organisation (EPFO) added a net 21.04 lakh members in the month of July. This is a year-on-year increase of 5.55%. EPFO added a net 9.79 lakh new members in July 2025. These include 5.98 lakh youth in the age group of 18-25, which constitutes 61.06% of the total new subscribers. The net payroll addition in this category was 9.13 lakh.

Ministry of Labour and Employment data shows that EPFO members are preferring to maintain their social security by transferring the balance in their EPF account instead of final set-



lement. According to the data, around 16.43 lakh old members who had left their jobs earlier have rejoined EPFO in July.

This represents a year-on-year growth of 12.12 percent. In July, 2.80 lakh new

women members joined, bringing the total female net payroll growth to approximately 4.42 lakh. This represents a 0.17 percent year-on-year growth, reflecting the growing diversity in the workforce.

A state-wise analysis of payroll data shows that the top five states/union territories recorded a growth of approximately 60.85 percent in total payroll, adding approximately 12.80 lakh net payroll payments during July.

Maharashtra led the states with a net payroll growth of 20.47 percent during July.

According to the ministry, these EPFO payroll data are provisional, as the process of updating employee records is ongoing. The Employees' Provident Fund Organization has been releasing these figures on a monthly basis since September 2017.

Dancing To The Tunes Of Devi - Navratri 2025



New Delhi: Navratri, which celebrates and honours the nine different forms of Mother Divine, also known as Nav Durga, is incomplete without grooving to the beats of Garba and Dandiya Raas. The vibrant costumes, diverse cuisine (while many prefer to fast too), and the clicking of Dandiya sticks accompanied by rhythmic music, laughter and enthusiasm infuse the atmosphere with devotion, love and joy. While spiritually it is a great time to connect with one's higher self and immerse oneself in the worship of Mother Divine, the festivities during the nine nights also offer the perfect opportunity to reconnect with family, friends, acquaintances and, most importantly, with our playful side!

Why are Garba and Dandiya Raas performed during Navratri?

Looking at the history of these two dance forms, both originated in the western state of Gujarat and are performed every night during the ten-day festival. These dance forms are believed to be a dramatization of the nine-day battle between Goddess Durga and the demon king Mahishasura, in which the Goddess emerges victorious in the end. These dances are performed with a sense of offering prayer to Mother Divine.

They symbolise the spirit of Navratri - the triumph of sattva over tamoguna or good over evil, even if that evil stems from one's mind. These nine days give us a chance to purify our minds push the reset button and start afresh.

Are Garba and Dandiya Raas the Same?

Though used interchangeably, Garba and Dandiya raas differ in their styles, origin and how they are performed.

Traditionally, Garba was performed around an earthen pot (garbo) with a lamp inside, which is called a 'garba-deep.' The lamp symbol-

ises life - a small foetus in the womb, in particular. The pot symbolises the body, within which divinity resides. To this day, garba continues to have a devotional appeal to it.

Today, it is also performed with the photo or idol of Goddess Durga in the centre. Dancers move around in circles that move in the counter-clockwise direction. If there is less space for everyone to make one circle, dancers form concentric circles that move in opposite directions. This gesture symbolizes the circle of life, which moves from life to death to rebirth, with only the Mother Divine as the unchanging centre of life.

How to do Garba?

The most common steps in garba involve stepping forward, bending, clapping, stepping back, and twirling, repeating the same order, while moving forward.

Story Time

It is believed that garba is performed as an expression of gratitude to Goddess Durga for bringing peace here after the fierce battle against the Asuras and the most celebrat-

ed annihilation of demon Mahishasura, the buffalo-headed king of demons, who symbolizes the purities and negativity in our mind.

Dandiya Raas

In this folk dance which is usually performed in pairs, both men and women dance with colourful and decorated bamboo sticks, striking them to the beats of songs. Dancers alternatively tap the sticks while holding them in their hands, sometimes even spinning them between their fingers. Dandiya has a more structured and high-energy beat often involving complex patterns of movements.

The colourful sticks used during Dandiya are believed to represent the sword of Goddess Durga. The dance form is a beautiful way of recreating the battle that took place between the Devi and the demon.

Traditional Attire

The traditional attire consists of a three-piece dress - the choli or blouse, chaniya or long skirt and an embellished dupatta (odhni).



Navratri 2025: Celebrating nine days with colors and foods that define the festival

New Delhi: Navratri is more than just a festival - it's a rhythm of devotion that fills homes with chants, lights, and aromas of sacred foods. Across the United States, Indian communities mark these nine nights with fasting, prayers, and dance, all dedicated to the nine forms of Goddess Durga. Each day carries its own color, meaning, and ritual, reminding devotees of the goddess's many qualities. This year, Sharad Navratri begins on Monday, September 22, 2025, and continues until Tuesday, September 30, with Vijayadashami (Dussehra) celebrated on October 2. While the festival is deeply spiritual, food plays a central role in worship. Known as bhog, these vegetarian offerings are prepared with reverence and symbolize a bridge between the devotee and the divine. Every day brings a unique dish aligned with the goddess's form and the symbolic color of the day.

Here's a look at the day-wise bhog offerings for Navratri 2025.

Day 1 - Shailaputri (White)

Navratri begins with dishes that are light, simple, and filling. Sabudana Khichdi, made with tapioca pearls and peanuts, is a common choice as it keeps you energized while fasting. Makhana Kheer, cooked slowly with milk and flavored with cardamom, brings in a touch of sweetness without being heavy. To round it out, Coconut Laddoos prepared with jaggery and fresh coconut add a chewy texture and natural taste.

Day 2 - Brahmacharini (Red)

Day two brings in deeper, vibrant flavors that feel both comforting and filling. A bowl of Tomato Soup, mildly spiced and tangy, works well for those observing fasts while still wanting something warm. Beetroot Parathas, with their earthy flavor, give the meal a wholesome edge. Many also turn to Pomegranate Salad, where each seed adds crunch and juice to the plate.

Day 3 - Chandraghanta (Blue)

Blue foods are less traditional in Indian kitchens, but devotees often make creative use of ingredients. A Blueberry Yogurt Parfait, layered with fruit, yogurt, and a drizzle of honey, offers a refreshing start. Blue Rice, colored naturally with butterfly pea flowers, adds something striking and unusual to the thali.

Day 4 - Kushmunda (Yellow)

The fourth day often sees bright, hearty dishes that feel warm and homely. Pumpkin Curry,

cooked with gentle spices, is filling without being too heavy, making it a reliable fasting meal. A Mango Smoothie, thick and naturally sweet, works as a cooling addition alongside the curry. Corn Fritters, fried crisp and golden, are also great.

Day 5 - Skandamata (Green)

Green foods dominate the fifth day, and they usually lean toward fresh, earthy flavors. Spinach and Potato Curry, mild but filling, is a classic combination that sits comfortably with fasting rules. A Green Apple Salad, with its tart crunch and hint of mint, helps cut through heavier foods and adds freshness to the plate. To balance the meal, you can make Cucumber Raita with yogurt and grated cucumber.

Day 6 - Katyayani (Grey)

Day six keeps things plain but hearty with dishes that highlight simple ingredients. Grey Lentil Soup, warm and protein-rich, makes for a filling base during fasting. Buckwheat Pancakes, slightly nutty in flavor, are light enough to enjoy with a drizzle of honey or a spoonful of yogurt. For dessert, Coconut Milk Pudding, set with jaggery, brings smooth texture and mild sweetness.

Day 7 - Kalaratri (Orange)

On the seventh day, foods in shades of orange add brightness and variety. Carrot Halwa, slow-cooked until soft and sweet, is often the highlight of the bhog, giving a festive feel to the meal. Sweet Potato Chaat, tossed with spices, lemon juice, and sometimes a hint of green chili, adds zest and tang. Add papaya salad for a sweet end.

Day 8 - Mahagauri (Peacock Green)

The eighth day focuses on greens that are light but flavorful. Green Bean Curry, cooked simply with spices, serves as the main dish, wholesome without being oily or heavy. A bowl of Mint Rice, aromatic and refreshing, works as a side that adds depth to the plate. Finishing the meal, a Herb Salad made with mint, basil, and cilantro adds freshness and crunch.

Day 9 - Siddhidatri (Pink)

The ninth day ends Navratri with foods that are colorful and sweet. A chilled Strawberry Smoothie, creamy and naturally pink, adds a festive feel. Rose Petal Jam, rich in fragrance, gives a traditional touch and is usually enjoyed in small amounts.



Peak age for football players: Ballon d'Or winners reveal changing trends

New Delhi, Agency: Every sport wrestles with the same question with each of its passing generation: when is a player at their absolute best? Well, football is not an exception to this query. From managers calculating contract extensions to scouts evaluating transfer targets, understanding the peak performance windows drives billion-dollar decisions. Few datasets would give us the peek into elite football excellence than the Ballon d'Or, awarded annually since 1956 to the world's best player.

The analysis of every winner from Stanley Matthews to Ousmane Dembélé reveals patterns that challenge conventional wisdom about when footballers truly peak.

The historical baseline

Since 1956, Ballon d'Or winners have averaged 27.4 years old, with a median around 27. This figure has long aligned with sports science research suggesting that elite performers reach their optimal blend of physical capabilities and tactical intelligence in their mid-

to-late twenties.

The traditional pattern shows clear categories -

Early prodigies: Players like Ronaldo Nazário, Michael Owen represent 15% of the winners, who achieved the feat in their early 20s

Vast Majority: Nearly two thirds of the winners belong this

group, who claimed their first Ballon d'Or between ages 24-29, from Johan Cruyff's peak years to the prime of most modern legends

Veteran winners: This comprises the smallest group of winners. Players ageing over 30 getting the honor is a rarity with Stanley Matthews' 41 year old wonder standing as a remarkable

Cristiano Ronaldo beaten by Barcelona midfielder Aitana Bonmatí; Lionel Messi's massive record under threat

New Delhi, Agency: Aitana Bonmatí has etched her name into football immortality. She has become the first woman to win three consecutive Women's Ballon d'Or awards following the latest addition at Monday's ceremony in Paris. The Barcelona and Spain midfielder claimed the 2025 honor, adding to her victories in 2023 and 2024. This officially makes her the most decorated player in Women's Ballon d'Or history.



Historic achievement in context

The 27-year-old's achievement places her in exclusive company among football's greatest individual performers. While Cristiano Ronaldo never managed three consecutive Ballon d'Ors, Lionel Messi remains the gold standard with four straight wins from 2009-2012.

PGTI suspends country's 17 top golfers, suspension sparks outrage

New Delhi, Agency: The Professional Golf Tour of India (PGTI) has suspended 17 professional golfers for participating in the Indian Golf Premier League (IGPL) Invitational Tournament at Jaypee Greens, Greater Noida, between September 17 and September 19.

The suspension list includes some of the most prominent names in Indian golf. Bhullar, one of India's most successful golfers, has represented the country at the Olympic Games and is a multiple-time Asian Tour winner. His suspension, alongside players such as Aman Raj, Harendra Gupta, Karandeep Kochhar and Sachin Baisoya, has led to distress across the golfing community.

Players are now considering approaching the judiciary to restore fairness and uniformity within PGTI. There have already been two cases filed by players before the Delhi High Court, the most recent being one by Ranjeet Open entry list, the players par-

Singh and Kapil Kumar.


The move has drawn severe criticism as the players were not even part of the entry or waiting list of the Chennai Open conducted by PGTI on the same dates.

Being outside the Chennai Open entry list, the players par-

ticipated in the IGPL event. However, the Disciplinary Action Committee (DAC) of PGTI, comprising five members, issued show cause notices and simultaneously passed suspension orders. It was reported by players that the DAC had overreached its authority, as it has no power to issue interim suspension orders prior to the completion of a full enquiry.

Players expressed that they have been unfairly targeted by PGTI for participating in IGPL tournaments, whereas many players, including members of the Governing Body and members of the DAC themselves, also participated in a tournament held in Pune on the same dates as the PGTI Tournament Next Gen.

WFI issues show-cause notice to Aman Sehrawat for missing weight at World Championships



New Delhi, Agency: The Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) on Monday issued a show-cause notice to Paris Olympics bronze medallist Aman Sehrawat for failing to make weight at the World Championships.

Aman was one of the strong medal contenders in the men's freestyle 57kg but weighed 1.7kg more than the permissible limit on the day of competition, leading to his disqualification.

The WFI also did not appreciate the fact that there were four coaches in Zagreb but they could not keep track of the weight management, and showcaused them also.

"This is not acceptable. We must find reasons behind it. In less than two months two of our good wrestlers got disqualified, we need to look into it, that's why we have issued a show cause notice to Aman," said a WFI official.

Chief coach Jagmohan Singh, Vinod, Virender and Narendra, who were with the freestyle wrestlers, will also have to provide an explanation.

"There were 10 wrestlers and four coaches. They should have kept track of this issue. They were there 15 days before competition. It was their responsibility as well. So they will also have to explain," added the official. The WFI has also decided, on an experimental basis, to do away with the weight tolerance system during the selection trials. Usually a 2kg weight tolerance is given to all competitors.

India's Speed Skating World Championships 2025 contingent returns with historic haul of three golds, two bronze

New Delhi, Agency: The Indian contingent that made history at the recently concluded Speed Skating World Championships in China returned to a warm welcome at the Delhi Airport on Tuesday. The team bagged a record-breaking total of three gold medals and two bronze, marking India's most successful outing at the global event to date.

Senior skater Anandkumar Velkumar led the charge with a sensa-

tional performance, becoming the first Indian to win a gold medal at the World Championships in the senior men's 1,000 m sprint, clocking a time of 1:24.924. He followed up with another gold in the men's marathon event, and also secured a bronze medal in the 500 m sprint, bringing his personal tally to three medals at the event.

According to the official website of World Skate, the global governing body for

roller sports, Anandkumar's achievements mark a historic milestone for India in a

sport traditionally dominated by European and East Asian countries.

India's medal count was further boosted by the junior athletes. Krish Sharma struck gold in the junior men's 1,000 m sprint, while Anish Raj claimed a bronze in the junior men's one-lap sprint event, taking the overall tally to three golds and two bronze medals. The championships were held from September 13 to 21 in China.

Roundglass Hockey Academy, Naval Tata Hockey Academy join SAI Sonipat in knockout phase

Jalandhar, Agency: The penultimate matchday of the league phase of the second edition of the Punjab Hockey League (U 21) saw Roundglass Hockey Academy and Naval Tata Hockey Academy confirm their places in the knockout stage, joining table toppers SAI Sonipat.

In the opening game of day 13, here at the Olympian Surjit Singh Hockey Stadium, Roundglass Hockey Academy defeated SDAT Hockey Academy 5-1. After a goalless first half, RGHA exploded in the third quarter with four goals in quick succession.

Amandeep opened the scoring in the 31st minute from a penalty corner before Jobanpreet Singh doubled the lead a minute later. Captain Gurdeep Singh and Sukhmanpreet Singh extended

the advantage, making it 4-0 heading into the final quarter. SDAT pulled one back through captain S. Krishnan in the 48th minute, but Amandeep restored the cushion almost immediately with his second goal. Anurag added a late strike for SDAT, but RGHA had already done enough to secure the three points and their knockout berth.

The second match produced the most drama of the day, with SGPC Hockey Academy defeating Naval Tata Hockey Academy 5-4 in a shootout after a thrilling 5-5 draw. SGPC's Shershahji Singh netted twice, while cap-



tain Sukhdev Singh, Harwinder Singh, and Kamaljeet Singh chipped in with a goal each. For Naval Tata, Ashish Tami Puri scored a brace, alongside goals from Patras Hassa, Mohit Nayak, and Anish Dungdung. Both teams collected a point, with Naval Tata moving to 24 points from 13 matches to seal qualification, while SGPC, with 16 points, including a bonus point for a shootout win, remains in contention for the final knockout spot.
